Software and Software Documentation Downloads

The THEMIS Software Web Page URL is <http://themis.ssl.berkeley.edu/software.shtml/>. The user can download released software and software documentation from this site. NOTE: The user can choose to download not yet released software (under 'Future Releases:'), but it is not recommended. While this software contains updates, enhancements, and bug fixes, full quality assurance testing has not been done. Use at your own risk.

System Requirements

The THEMIS Data Analysis Software requires an IDL developer's license for Windows or a UNIX-like operating system, e.g. Solaris, Linux, or Mac OS X. The software has been tested on IDL 6.3, 6.4, 7.0, & 7.1 but should work on any level of IDL above 6.2. The GUI works best on version 6.4 or above. The external package, IDL_GEOPACK(for Tsyganenko Model), requires version 6.4 or above.

Installation

For a new installation:

1. Download and expand the latest TDAS release .zip file. See section 2.3 THEMIS Science Software.
2. Create a directory called TDAS into which you will copy the latest software.
3. Move the tdas_x_xx folder into the TDAS directory you created.
4. Configure IDL to search the TDAS directory for IDL programs. See section 5.3.1 IDL PATH setup.

For an upgrade of an existing installation of TDAS, as per the above 4 steps:

1. Remove old tdas_x_xx from the TDAS directory.
2. Download and expand the latest TDAS release .zip file.
3. Copy the new tdas_x_xx directory into the pre-existing TDAS directory.
4. Re-start IDL.

CDF File Formats

It is important to note that there is a patch to IDL, which is recommended for best handling of the CDF file format that is used by the THEMIS data files. See: http://cdf.gsfc.nasa.gov/html/cdf_patch_for_idl6x_new.html If you are using IDL 6.2, Intel Mac with any version of IDL, or IDL 7.0/7.1 you must install this patch to read CDF files properly. Special note for Mac: If there are problems with the files you downloaded from GSFC, please download them from the THEMIS ftp site http://themis-tmsserver1.ssl.berkeley.edu/~themis/public_share/idl_mac/.

Mac OS X Notes

You need X11 to view plots and use the GUI in IDL. You can search for X11 in the Spotlight to see if the X11 application is installed on your system. X11 is available on your Mac installation disks, but may not be installed by default.

Note that X11 must be running, not just installed to properly view IDL plots.

There is a known problem, mentioned in the IDL 6.3 release notes, which affects all IDL users running Mac OS 10.4 (Tiger). The tlimit command will lock up IDL because the plot window will not receive any mouse clicks.

Workaround: Change the X11 start-up parameters. Do the following:

1. Open any terminal window (in X11 application menu bar, choose xterm from the applications menu)
2. Enter the following at the shell prompt: > defaults write com.apple.x11 wm_click_through -bool true
3. Quit X11 (if it is running).

The new default will take effect the next time you start X11, and it will persist from that point (i.e., you will not have to make the change again).



Linux Notes

There are problems with some versions of Ubuntu and IDL graphic objects. If you find that widgets are not realized when opening a new window, you may need to turn visual effects off. This can be done using ubuntu system preferences and setting Visual effects to none.

IDL Setup (Unix, Linux or Mac OS X)

Path: For Windows or IDLDE on UNIX, you can use the File->Preferences widget to set up the path so IDL can find the THEMIS IDL files. For additional details on how to do this please see section 5.3, Installation and Configuration of the Software User's Guide.

Command Line: For the command line version of IDL, installation consists of setting up the IDL_PATH environment variable. For additional details on how to do this please see section 5.3, Installation and Configuration of the Software User's Guide.

The most common problem people have is with an improperly configured path.

Data Directory Setup

The THEMIS Data Analysis Software requires a local data directory in which THEMIS data files can be cached. The software will attempt to create the local data directory for you at the following default location, depending on your operating system.

OS	LOCAL_DATA_DIR
Windows	C:\data\themis
Solaris, Linux, Mac OS X	~/data/themis

Known Limitations

1. Incompatibilities with Solar Software (SSW). Some names clash if both TDAS and SSW are on your IDL_PATH.
2. ASI data: ASF (full resolution ASI data) requires a 64-bit machine to load more than 1 hour's worth of data.
3. "Warning for IDL 7.0 users. A bug has been found with IDL 7.0 and CDFs that cause crashes on any operating system when loading CDF data. All IDL 7.0 users must go to: http://cdf.gsfc.nasa.gov/html/cdf_patch_for_idl6x_new.html and install this patch."
4. The IDL executive command `.reset_session` does not work for the THEMIS GUI software. Please use the command `.full_reset_session` to reset IDL sessions
5. If any command line procedure has an IDL stop or suspend within it, other code such as the GUI will stop until the user continues. Likewise, when the GUI has a modal panel up the themis or idl command line will not execute until the window is dismissed.
6. The TDAS software is based on "tplot", which is a suite of IDL programs developed in the 1990's and extensively used by other missions, such as FAST, WIND, CLUSTER, and STEREO/IMPACT. It is possible that users may have older copies of the tplot software in the IDL path, from other missions. We recommend that you only keep the TDAS version of the tplot software in your IDL path; this is the only version that is currently supported.

See section 5.3. Installation and Configuration of the Software User's Guide for information on IDL path setup. It is possible to find if there are multiple versions of tplot in your IDL path using the TDAS routine "libs", for example:

```
IDL> libs, 'tplot'
```

should return something that looks like this:

```
C:\idlpro\tdas_5_21\idl\ssl_general\tplot\tplot.pro
```

If more than one entry is returned, then the non-TDAS tplot directory should be removed from your IDL path. If this causes a problem with older software, then please contact the THEMIS software team, and we will find and attempt to fix the problem.



Getting Help

Web Page: From either the Software or Contact Us Web Pages the user can send comments, observations, problems or questions about data access, software or web site content. A help request form is available for your use.

GUI: By clicking on the "HELP" drop down menu on the GUI Main window or if the THEMIS Science Software GUI detects an error, a Help Request Form will be displayed. When you click 'Save', the error report form and history file will be saved. Please email error report forms, history files, or other information to the

Graphical User Interface

To start the THEMIS GUI the user needs to start up IDL.

At the IDL command line type: `idl> thm_gui_new`

Once the main GUI window is open the user can select from several pull down menus and/or toolbar buttons.

To Load Data: From the File pull-down menu, select Load THEMIS Data or select the toolbar button Load Data.

To Plot Data: From the Graph pull-down menu, select Plot/Layout Options.

To Print: From the File pull-down menu, select Export Image to File. Select encapsulated post script. Print resolution can be increased to publication quality by clicking the 'Options' button.

Common Problems:

Common Problem #1

"I get an error similar to:

```
% Attempt to call undefined procedure/function: "THM_FUNCTION".
```

```
% Execution halted at: $MAIN$ "
```

Solution:

9 times out of 10 this is because of a problem with the configuration of your IDL path. IDL is fairly finicky about the way it needs to be told where files are.

What solution is best depends on your IDL version.

IDLDE 7.0/7.1:

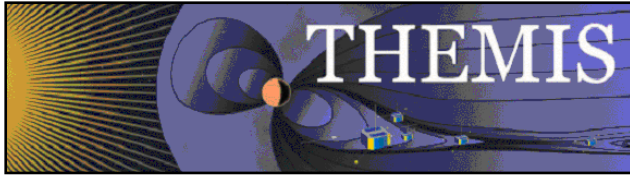
- a) Open the window->preferences menu.
- b) Select IDL->Paths
- c) Select Insert.
- d) Select the top level directory in which you installed TDAS, and select Ok
- e) Check the box next to the left of the newly created directory and select Ok.
- f) Type `.full_reset_session` at the idl command line.

IDLDE 6.4 or earlier:

- a) Open the file->preferences menu.
- b) Select Paths
- c) Select Insert.
- d) Select the top level directory in which you installed TDAS, and select Ok
- e) Check the box next to the left of the newly created directory and select Ok.
- f) Type `.full_reset_session` at the idl command line.

IDL command line(all versions):

You need to configure the IDL_PATH environment variable with the location of the installed files. Depending on your OS/command line environment there are many different ways to do it. In all cases, it is very important to remember to put a '+' before the directory name. This tells IDL to search the subdirectories recursively. Below are solutions for common environments.



Bash:

- a) Put the following line into you `.bashrc` or `.bash_profile`:
`export IDL_PATH='<IDL_DEFAULT>:/path/to/tdas'`
- b) Replace `/path/to/tdas` with your actual installation directory.
- c) Restart your shell/terminal or source your `.bashrc/.bash_profile` to be sure that changes took effect.
- d) Restart IDL

CSH/TCSH:

- a) Put the following line into you `.cshrc`:
`setenv IDL_PATH '<IDL_DEFAULT>:/path/to/tdas'`
- b) Replace `/path/to/tdas` with your actual installation directory.
- c) Restart your shell/terminal or source your `.bashrc/.bash_profile` to be sure that changes took effect.
- d) Restart IDL

Common Problem #2:

- "I made a change in a program and the changes don't take effect" or
- "I put a new version of a program I got from a colleague in my work space and IDL finds the old one" or
- "I reinstalled a new version of TDAS that is supposed to fix my problem, but it still doesn't work."

Solution:

IDL keeps copies of compiled programs in memory to improve performance. The downside to this is that it doesn't always update these copies when you change a program on the disk.

- a) If your change is only in a single program, you should always recompile that program after making a change. You can do this using the command `.compile program_name`. Where "program_name" is the name of the program you changed.
- b) If your change is in multiple programs (like a new version of TDAS), the best solution is to reset your session by typing the `.full_reset_session` command. Be warned, however, any work you have in your current session will be deleted. You should always save your work before a `.full_reset_session`.
